My name is Gail Patton. I am the Executive Director of Unlimited Future, Inc. (UFI), a microenterprise development organization in the Fairfield neighborhood of Huntington, WV. UFI was established as a 501(c)3 non profit in 1993. The mission of Unlimited Future is to provide, for start-up and emerging businesses, a not for profit business development center which creates an environment for entrepreneurial success by providing a physical facility, education, and operational support, including the expertise of a network of advisors. The center is designed to assist participating businesses, especially minority businesses, in their efforts to reduce overhead expenses, compete effectively in markets, and create jobs. There are over 130 successful businesses operating in the tri-state area today that have taken advantage of UFI's programs in some form or another. These businesses employ over three hundred people, and many have been in operation for over five years.
